RECAP of the Southern Vermont Zone CEDS Partners and Partnership:

The Brattleboro Development Credit Corporation is a private, nonprofit economic development organization that serves as a catalyst for industrial and commercial growth throughout Southeastern Vermont, including Windham County and the towns of Readsboro, Searsburg, and Weston. BDCC serves as the State of Vermont's certified Regional Development Corporation (RDC) for the greater Windham County area. BDCC is one of 12 RDCs throughout Vermont. Southeastern Vermont Economic Development Strate gies (SeVEDS) is an affiliate of BDCC that grew from a 2008 grassroots effort, initiated by BDCC, to reverse the economic decline of the Windham Region and plan for the economic impacts from the closure of the Vermont Yankee nuclear power plant. In 2014, a fter multiple years of regional input, education and data gathering, SeVEDS submitted the Windham Region's federally recognized S.M.A.R.T. The **Bennington County Regional Commission** (BCRC) was created by the seventeen towns and villages it serves and works on behalf of those

municipalities to build strong, resilient, and sustainable communities, to foster economic prosperity, and to promote a high qua lity of life for residents of the region. For more information visit www.bcrcvt.org.

The Regional Economic Development Working Group (RED Group) is a volunteer body committed to increasing the shared prosperity and quality of life for the seventeen munic ipalities in southwestern Vermont. The group has a diverse membership that reflects the varied community, business, workforce, and demographic characteristics of the region. The RED Group focuses on the internal and external economic development issues t hat affect the Bennington County region as a whole; the regional implications of local economic development issues; the process of regional economic development from local, state, and federal perspectives; and options for future initiatives.

The <u>2019 Southern Ver</u> mont Comprehensive Economic Development <u>Strategy</u> was completed by the partners and submitted for final approval in November of 2019 and accepted by the EDA in January of 2020.

The 2019 plan created by Windham and Bennington County stakeholders is a long term strategy to grow the <u>Southern Vermont Economy Zone</u> – a region facing significant economic challenges established by the Vermont State Legislature in 2015. The 2019 Zone CEDS is intended to replace the <u>2014 Windham Region S.M.A.R.T. CEDS.</u>

The 2018 Southern Vermont Economy Summit at Mount Snow in May served as a kick off for the overall Southern Vermont CEDS project which was undertaken from November of 2017 through May of 2019 and a draft document was published for 30 day comment on January 7, 2019 after a public presentation in Wilmington, VT.`

Zone economics in 2020:

Windham County: At the end of 2019 and the beginning of January of 2020 BDCC real estate was fully occupied, with major capital improvements and tenant expansions under way. A high school career development program,

Pipelines and Pathways¹, was in full swing with classes and field trips, and development of an immigrant and asylum-seeking resettlement program, the

Southern Vermont Welcoming Communities project² was taking shape across both counties. A community fiber to the premises project in five towns was organized. Small business lending and technical assistance was expanding. The Southern Vermont Economy Project had recently been funded a second time by the USDA, helping create shared regional technical expertise and the ability to implement more local projects.



Marlboro College's small size and dwindling enrollment led it to begin exploring merging with another college or university. Discussions advanced with the <u>University of Bridgeport</u> but were called off in September 2019 as negotiations continued. [4] Two months later, the college announced plans to

merge with Emerson College in Boston. As per the agreement, Marlboro would give its endowment to Emerson where all Marlboro students will be admitted, and tenure-track faculty will be able to choose to teach at Emerson. The deal was finalized by the Board of Trustees of Marlboro and Emerson Colleges on July 23, 2020. Marlboro closed its campus at the end of the 2019–2020 academic year and the college ceased operations on August 15, 2020. ³

And then COVID-19 arrived in Vermont.

COVID - 19 Response

And with it a true crisis. But this region also has had some experience in disasters, from the sudden devastation of Tropical Storm Irene⁴ to the slow retreat of dollars and people after Vermont Yankee's closure⁵. We applied what we have learned from these experiences: the need to act quickly and commit to long-term response, to act together as well as strategically.

We stood up BDCC's COVID-19 regional Business Resiliency Program just days after the governor's first order to close nonessential businesses and schools. We launched weekly webinars to connect the region's community and economic development organizations with state

Bringing Relief to the Windham Region Is Our Top Priority

During the pandemic, BDCC has focused on ensuring COVID-19 funds reach as many local businesses and nonprofits as possible through education, outreach, and direct technical assistance. By September 2020, Windham County received the second highest level of VT CARES Act relief funds allocated to small businesses and employers - 30% more than the next county. Federal PPP lending is helping 901 organizations in the Windham region, which has 6.8% of the state poulation but had 8.1% of Vermont's PPP recipients. Awards under \$150,000 totaled \$27.7 million in Windham -7.4% of the total allocated statewide. PPP awards of \$150,000+ in the Windham region represented 6.2% of awards statewide in that category.

officials and federal delegation staffers and with information on complex regulations and relief. We put in place a BDCC liaison system for every business and all BDCC tenants to have personal support in navigating the crisis. In 10 weeks, we engaged with 444 local businesses and nonprofits who needed reliable information, technical assistance, referrals, and moral support. We continue providing information and support as state and federal relief is in flux.

For long-term recovery we are adapting programs and creating contingencies while reconsidering how best to advance our mission. This rethinking is informed by a recognition that we have an important role to play in advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion through economic opportunity. Vermonters adapt. This has served us well, navigating a staged reopening while working to keep one another safe. There are more changes to come, and we will rise to the challenge.

Bennington County: BCIC entered the new decade with well - earned optimism from a series of successes: the mid -2019 groundbreaking for the Putnam Block, Vermont's largest downtown redevelopment project; successful solicitation of Opportunity Zone investments in the region's two designated tracts; support for successful employer - led workforce development programs; the emergence of an innovative multi - municipal partnership for rural broadband connectivity; exploratory development of a regenerative food hub with local institutions wor king closely with key

"It's a little uncertain as to be expected," he said. "I think like

investors; and momentum around proactive approaches to reversing demographic decline.

This optimism helped buoy the region as BCIC and its partners learned of new challenges in 2019. Facing the closure of a liberal arts college in May 2019, and the October 2019 announcement of the planned closure of a large manufacturer, constructive dialog ues with a range of stakeholders focused on possibilities and practicalities.

The pandemic has certainly reoriented how BCIC approaches day -to-day work, but it has first and foremost been an affirmation of the approach to economic development across South ern Vermont: informed, timely, personal, and persistent. We have leveraged our relationships with state personnel, as well as elected officials in Montpelier and in Washington, to provide answers to the questions of more than 400 businesses within the region. We have drawn on the personal and professional networks of our boards and regional partners to ensure that information reaches the relevant audiences, whether it pertains to federal and state business assistance programs, executive orders for public he alth, evolving guidance around unemployment regulations, or other time -sensitive matters. We have submitted grant applications on behalf of our region's all - volunteer local broadband connectivity initiative that have brought nearly \$200,000 to this fledgli ng organization that will deliver fiber where the market will not. And, just as important, we continue to keep attention and energy focused on is working in our region: ample opportunities for remote work, programming

focused on quality of life to help newer residents form lasting connections with their communities, and new options for student, workforce, and market rate housing in our region's IEDC award - winning revitalization project at the Putnam Block.

SVHC makes \$3.2 million offer for Southern Vermont College property

Vermont Business Magazine Southwestern Vermont Health Care (SVHC) has submitted an offer to the bankruptcy trustee overseeing liquidation of assets of the former Southern Vermont College. The signed offer is for \$3.2 million and includes the real estate property and facilities of the main campus. The leadership of the health system, through the direction of its Board of Directors, is committed to developing a long-range plan to maximize the use of this valuable community asset as well as how the property could enhance community and health-related services for the southern Vermont region.

The intent is to keep the property locally owned, with a goal to make the athletic fields and its myriad trails accessible for the community. Before submitting its offer, SVHC contacted the leadership of the Town of Bennington to explore opportunities and develop together strategies for the former college campus and associated assets.



The topline goals of the Southern Vermont CEDS are to strengthen business and support people. Five objectives were identified to meet those goals: increase our population, improve our physical infrastructure, enhance our social infrastructure, expand our business infrastructure, and develop our economic development infrastructure. Annually projects are submitted to help achieve this goal and they may be found in this report's appendix.



- Applejack Stadium, Town of Manchester
 - \$75,000 to expand seating, renovate grandstand, and improve access and circulation at Southern Vermont's highest-rated soccer facility.
 - Upgrades required as an element of new partnership with Black Rock FC, a professional soccer team that will play home games at the stadium.
 - Part of Town's intentional pivot from retail-based economy to sports tourism and outdoor recreation.

Enhance our Social Infrastructure:

Improve quality of life and stability for residents.

 BDCC Community Facilities Technical Assis tance Program SCOPE: Windham Region help qualified designed projects and applicants project development management, and with becoming successful applicants to the USDA Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Programs. This program has helped fire departments, childcare projects and the Vernon Homes nursing home facility get



into the pipeline for USDA funding last year.

Though the project was ultimately not funded, the region anticipates seeking other means of moving the project forward in 2021.
